1. Introduction

This document records the outcomes of our last improvement plan, the findings of this self-evaluation, and our current improvement plan, including targets and the actions we will implement to meet the targets.

1.1 Outcomes of our last improvement plan from [September 2020] to [May 2021]

Literacy

- An emphasis on reading with all Junior Cycle students.
- An emphasis on oral presentations with all Junior Cycle students

Numeracy

- While school strategy for calculating percentages
- Problem Solving strategy

E-Learning

- CPD in-house for remote learning, for new staff and first years
- Maintaining online learning with Google classroom in the event of another lockdown.
- Student remote learning training and practice.
- Purchasing of a new set of Chromebooks
- Agreed timetable for scheduling of Classroom Based Assessments

Homework

- Homework Club promoted among parents.
- Free homework club for all Junior Cycle students.
- Continued whole school emphasis on importance of Homework (Frequency, sanctions)

New Junior Cycle

- Supporting parents with information about New Junior Cycle, particularly with understanding, CBA'S for 1st and 2nd years.
- Agreed timetable for scheduling of Classroom Based Assessments
- A new Parent Induction will run alongside 1st Year induction starting next academic year

DEIS and SSE amalgamation

- Staff CPD on 3 year DEIS plan 2020-2023.
- Whole staff on DEIS committees under each strand during CP hours to encourage uptake.
- Planning for "Assessment strand 22/23"

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1.2 The focus of this evaluation

The focus of the evaluation is to look at how we can embed these practices across all areas of school life. This year our biggest challenges was remaining open safely during Covid.

Planning Stage

• We want school to improve our whole school approach to Assessment, we plan to make it the focus of our SSE process for 2022 - 23.

2. Findings

2.1 This is effective / very effective practice in our school

- Literacy This year restrictions and high Covid cases still meant that with the best intentions some elements of the plan were not possible. We are missing the use of the library and literacy boxes.
- Numeracy It did not embed the RUMPUR, instead we focused on delivering the best teaching under the most difficult conditions.
- ELearning we continued to excel.
- Homework Although the Homework Club was fully functional, we found first years were not as receptive to it. We are continually striving to push homework as a vital whole school strategy, we believe the return to home rooms next year will help this.
- New Junior Cycle This year we tried to highlight the importance of CBA's among both parents and students. We held two coffee mornings for 1st and 2nd year parents to explain CBA's and grading.

2.2. This is how we judged our progress:

- Literacy testing in first years have shown a comprehension difficulty among almost half of our current first years. This will be a big focus for next year.
- Numeracy is always struggling in our school, we will continue to look at how we report grades, allowing students to work out their scores, this will be emphasised next year, with a standard test cover page for all.
- E- Learning continues to go from strength to strength, there was a second set of Chromebooks purchased at the beginning of the year.
- We have invested in seven new interactive whiteboards for Aug 2022.
- Form teachers and Year Heads are both reporting a lack of homework being recorded in the journals, parents have also raised this issue.

- We are further striving to embed practical literacy and numeracy practices in our school. We carried out our testing later in the year and this is something we will not do again.
- We will continue to promote and encourage our Homework Club, while identifying students who may need specific supports from teachers within the group
- We will communicate our new DEIS targets in accessible language in prominent places throughout the school
- Planning we had five meetings of the voluntary Assessment committee to plan for SSE for next year, this proved very effective.
